ne of the features of *set: Research Information for Teachers* is the broad range of topics it covers. In the last issue we were able to highlight junior primary in a number of articles. This time we go to the other end of the spectrum and focus on senior secondary. In between is a rich smorgasbord of recent research on literacy teaching and learning, collaborative approaches to professional development in the visual arts, and assessment in social studies. Assessment also features in the piece by Chris Joyce and Rosemary Hipkins on what constitutes progress in science learning.
